



Growth in Cumulative Funding: 2000-2024



This graph illustrates the exponential increase in cumulative funding over a 25-year period –from just \$15–25 million in 2000 to an estimated \$1.5–2.0 billion by 2024. The data highlight the long-term commitment *and* scale of investment that has accelerated significantly over the past two decades.




