Peer-to-Peer Learning Exchange Programme on Livelihoods and Wildlife-Based Economy in the Great Limpopo Transfrontier Conservation Area (GLTFCA)

Proposed Activities

The 5-day Peer-to-Peer Learning Exchange Program planned to take place in the GLTFCA (30 August – 06 September 2025) will include the following activities:

Workshop and Presentations (1 day): Thematic workshop led by experts will cover topics such as sustainable livelihoods, wildlife-based enterprises, and community engagement strategies – Perpectives and initiatives from different landscapes/countries with a focus on TFCAs

Case Studies and Imersion sites Visits (3 days): Visits to successful wildlife-based enterprises and community-led conservation projects within the Greater Kruger area including the Kruger-2-Canyons (K2C) Biosphere, DFFE Bioprospecting/BioTrade projects and input from private companies on same to learn from real-life examples and best practices.
