### SADC TFCA Heads of State Summit and what it means to the SADC TFCA Network

- Summit Held in Harare, Zimbabwe and celebrated the 25 year- milestone existence of the TFCA
- Who participated: Heads of States, Ministers of Environment, Government Agencies, ICPs, Implementing Partners, CBOs, Community leadership, NGOs, TFCAs.
- WHY THE SUMMIT MATTERED: Political platform that directly influences our work at ground and regional levels.
  - Heads of State commitment through their Summit Communique and Ministers Decisions.
  - OUR WORK-GUIDED BY THESE DECISIONS AND HEADS OF STATE COMMUNIQUE

# Decisions from the TFCA Summit of the SADC Heads of State and Governments held in Harare, Zimbabwe, May 2025

Decision #	Issue	Action
1	Implementation of the SADC Transfrontier Conservation Areas Programme 2023-2033	s (TFCAs)
i.	Ministers urged Member States, Partners and all the relevant TFCA Practitioners to continue with collaborative efforts towards maximizing the objectives of the establishment of TFCAs and , including using a wide range of existing regional instruments, approved by SADC Member States, as part of the implementation of the SADC TFCA Programme, to strengthen the establishment and operationalization of TFCAs.	Member States to work towards this decision





# Decisions from the Transfrontier Conservation Areas (TFCA) Summit of the SADC Heads of State and Governments held in Harare, Zimbabwe, May 2025

2	Improved Well-being and Rural Livelihoods in TFCAs	
i.	Ministers urged Member States to strengthen the meaningful active participation of rural communities and accountability to ensure equitable benefit sharing in TFCAs.	Member States to work towards this
ii.	Ministers urged Member States to consider the development of tailor made, practical and effective approaches to address increased human wildlife conflicts involving all the relevant development and conservation sectors	decision
iii.	Ministers urged partners to prioritise the development of solutions including legislation to address Human Wildlife Conflict in their support to the region	





Decision #	Issue	Action
3	Transboundary Biodiversity Management	
a.	Ministers urged Member States to strengthen coordinated efforts to protect biodiversity in shared ecosystems by addressing issues like poaching, illegal logging, harvesting of plant species, and habitat fragmentation that can occur across borders	Member States and ICPs to work
b.	Ministers urged Member States to consider reviving the SADC Rhino Management Group, in collaboration with relevant partners	towards this decision
C.	Ministers urged Member States to strengthen Indigenous Knowledge systems, coordinated and expanded research programmes including dissemination and application of research outputs to advance biodiversity conservation	
d.	Ministers urged International community to recognize the successes made by TFCAs work within the SADC region, including through influencing decision-making processes in CITES to promote sustainable use of wildlife in the region to continue supporting the livelihoods of local communities and increased conservation efforts.

4	Marine Transboundary Conservation Areas		
a.	Ministers urged Member States to promote the establishment of coastal and marine TFCAs, to adequately implement the SADC Blue Economy Strategy and Action Plan and produce tangible and sustainable benefits to local communities, regional economy and biodiversity conservation with regional and international impacts	Start processes of engaging relevant Member States	
b.	Ministers urged Member States to strengthen joint management of shared marine ecosystems, to safeguard the livelihoods of coastal communities dependent on fishing and marine tourism	Member States to work towards this decision	
С.	Ministers urged Member States to strengthen inclusive financing in their national budgets for TFCA in Marine Protected Areas.		
d.	Ministers urged Member States to strengthen benefit-sharing mechanisms in Marine TFCAs to ensure equitable benefits to the local communities and <b>e.,</b> Partners to support the region in this regard

5	SADC Law Enforcement Anti-poaching (LEAP) Strategy Implementation	
i.	Ministers urged Member States to strengthen the implementation of the LEAP Strategy as a pivotal tool for the region's collective efforts in tackling wildlife crime, reinforcing the need for multi-level cooperation among Member States, international partners, and local communities in TFCAs	Member States to work towards this
ii.	Ministers urged Member States to enhance mobilization of financial resources to support LEAP implementation initiatives in TFCAs, ensuring that anti-poaching efforts receive the necessary funding for sustained impacts	decision
iii.	Ministers urged Member States to integrate the LEAP Strategy with other national and regional frameworks, ensuring coherence in the region's approach to biodiversity conservation and sustainable development, including strengthening LEAP implementation structures within TFCAs	
iv.	Ministers urged Member States to urge International and Regional partners to support effective implementation of the SADC LEAP Strategy	





Decision #	Issue	Action	
6	SADC Law Enforcement Anti-poaching (LEAP) Strategy Implementation		
a.	Ministers urged Member States to secure sustainable financing for TFCAs by diversifying funding sources, exploring innovative solutions such as carbon markets, biodiversity offsets and bonds (using its wildlife capital, like elephants, rhinos and others), eco-tourism, and public-private partnerships (PPPs)	Member States to work towards this decision	
b.	Ministers urged Member States to engage with the private sector, local communities, and international cooperating partners to create new funding streams, including ecosystem services payments (PES), to provide long-term financial support for conservation		
c.	Ministers urged Member States to integrate sustainable financing models into national policies, ensuring TFCAs are sufficiently financed through private investments, tax incentives, and collaborative management partnerships (CMPs)		
d.	Ministers urged Member States to develop or strengthen frameworks for carbon credits and biodiversity credits, enabling TFCAs to tap into global markets and unlock private sector contributions, including incentives for nature-based investments		
e.	Ministers directed SADC Secretariat to coordinate a SADC Resource mobilization working group for sustainable financing of TFCAs in the region.	Working Group Exist. Secretariat to facilitate meetings	





Decision #	Issue	Action
7.	Increasing Tourism and Business Investments In TFCAS	
i,	Ministers urged Member States to develop SADC TFCAs Integrated Tourism Investment Development Plan and align it with national investment plans informed by Biodiversity features and align it with national investment plans	Member States to work towards this decision





### Implications for the TFCA Network

## **Opportunities:**

- Greater political traction for TFCA activities
- Support and increased opportunities for access to national, regional or international funding
- Enhanced cross-border cooperation and regional integration
- Integration of regional conservation goals

## Responsibilities or Challenges:

- Need for better reporting and monitoring
- Alignment of national TFCA efforts with regional priorities
- Possible policy harmonization requirements

- ✓ High interest in "HOW TO" Finance Solutions for Nature & Cross-Border Models


## **Primary Challenges:**

- ✓ Lack of Diversified and Long-Term Finance
- ✓ Limited Access to Viable Financial Tools
- ✓ Difficulty in Articulating Bankable / Investment Cases
- ✓ Low Institutional Readiness
- ✓ Weak Stakeholder Coordination



## 2. What is a Community of Practice?


- A Community of Practice (CoP) is:
- ✓ A group of individuals who share a concern, passion, or interest in a subject
- ✓ Who learn from one another through regular interaction, aiming to improve collectively



Community of Practice


- Shared Domain: Members have a common area of interest, expertise, or profession.
- Community: There is a sense of belonging and social interaction among members.
- **Practice:** Members are actively engaged in learning and improving their skills related to the domain.
- Knowledge Sharing: CoPs foster the exchange of ideas, best practices, and lessons learned.
- **Problem Solving:** Members collaborate to address challenges and develop innovative solutions.
- Continuous Learning: CoPs provide a supportive environment for ongoing professional development and growth.



To manage, monitor, and evaluate the Group via effective, efficient, and transparent governance













## Set out to revive the SADC regional initiative from 2000
